Election Day thoughts

Election day is just around the corner and with early voting starting today, I wanted to send an email to all of the people I've had the pleasure to meet during my nearly seven years serving on the council and beyond. In some ways I've felt like I never left, as I've had the wonderful opportunity to work with Councillor Shreve on his weekly emails and on some of the trickier issues that have come up over time. He's done a great job of representing the district and I've loved being a small part of his efforts.

I hope everyone gets out to vote as the choice for a new city councillor is an important one. As it is also a personal one, I don't want to recommend one candidate over another, but I would like to suggest some key considerations for you to ponder as you cast your vote. The role of city councillor is very important as they are the voice of the district when you need someone to go in and fight for a key issue or champion a critical need. So I recommend looking at each candidate and deciding which best fits these important traits and/or has experience in these areas:

- Zoning laws: When you need someone to fight off a bad development, such as the music venue that was proposed at the old GM Stamping Plant site, the gravel crushing facility that wanted to open next to Germania Creek, the scrapping company that opened illegally next to Garfield Park, or the strip club in the Old Southside that was causing issues for the neighborhood (all of which I had to fight and more), you need someone who understands how to stand boldly before the zoning board and point out the reasons that a zoning case or variance should be denied.
- Abandoned Housing: This is more than just addressing one bad house at a time, as you want someone who has
 worked on comprehensive housing surveys in their neighborhood, advocated for changes to improve housing
 laws (such as landlord registries or changes to high weed policies), and worked with the city on a holistic plan to
 improve troubled areas.
- <u>Infrastructure</u>: The city budget is so strapped when it comes to street, sidewalk, and alley repairs that you need a representative that looks at needs across the district and advocates for the worst of the worst. This means meeting with neighborhoods and helping them prioritize their lists and document their needs to help advocate the most effectively that they can.
- <u>Public Safety</u>: While the district has not seen as much violent crime as other areas of town, we have still experienced enough violent crime, as well as theft and garage break-ins, that this needs to be a focus. You want a representative that has worked with the police, gone on ride-a-longs, hosted roll calls, and partnered with the key members of IMPD and built important relationships over time.
- <u>Economic Development</u>: Each neighborhood is at different stages of growth, but all of our neighborhoods need someone advocating for good projects and developments that will improve the quality of life of the area. Your representative should be someone that has worked with the city to promote the various needs of their neighborhood in a way that attracts good developers and partners with them on the success of the neighborhood.

There are likely many more considerations, but all of these are key. At the end of the day, you need someone that will be a pitbull for the district needs, for your neighborhood needs, and for your own needs. As long as this is what drives them each day, then you will have chosen a great candidate. I do hope you vote in the election and that you give

consideration to these thoughts as you do. I truly enjoyed serving the district and I look forward to supporting our next city councillor in the years to come!
